There are approximately 45 Higher education institutions that offer aeronautical courses.

Private Funded Establishments

There are approximately 10 privately run companies that offer Pt 66 training



* Although anyone with the appropriate entry qualifications and a big enough bank account can train here, this establishment as well as the others mainly cater for corporate businesss as well as the smaller to medium sized airline operators

The Big Boys

No specific Pt 66 courses offered to the public, sponorship of employees is generaly available as required.

The Other Big Boys

Many large organisations and operators exist in the UK. They Include:

Virgin Airlines, Ryan Air BAeSystems Airbus UK QinetiQ RAE Farnborough Brintel Helicopters Bond Helicopters Airbus Helicopters Westland Helicopters

These companies generally offer apprenticeship level training (BTEC HNC) and would sponsor company employees to private acadamies if there was any Pt66 requirement.

However!

You normally have to self fund examinations, Training materials, and all ohter incidental costs. Also if licences are obtained most companies insist on signing retainers (normally 5-7 years).

Other Methods

There are of course other methods for the private individual to obtain Pt 66 License by post (Very expensive and can take up to 5 years, and you still have to do the full probation period.) Purhase, copy or steal the Training notes and self study, again the above caveat applies. Emigrate to another EASA member country and enrole as an overseas student, (can be expensive, but at least you wil not get ripped of by the UK goverment).

And Finally

The Military

The Royal Navy Mainly Helicopters but does operate a few fast jets. No Pt66 requirements at all

The British Army (Army Air Corps, REME) Mainly Attack/light transport helicopters but does operate small AOP's. No Pt66 requirements at all

The Worlds First independent Air Force (1st of April 1918) and in my opinion the best in the world, Her Majesties Finest Ladies and Gentlemen, I Give you The Royal Air Force Operates most aircraft platfoms Pt 66 Requirement for MRTT Voyager (A330)* Pt 66 Training provided by City of Bristol College.



Why so Few establishments?

Considering what the United Kingdom has given to the aviation industry over the last 100+ years why are there few oppurtunities to undergo Pt 66 Training without getting ripped off??







Money

Political interference in the education System Engineering is dirty Engineering is difficult (for students and instructors) Lack of corporate will Poor renumeration (poor wages train drivers earn more) Schoolboys do not like hard work

Conclusions

There are 14 Training establishment that are 147 approved, offer Pt66 full time education and are open to the general public,

To support a population that is approaching 60 million,

With the British Airports Authority (BAA) insisting on another runway at London Heathrow,

With public transport aviation set to increase by at least 30% in the next 10 years

The UK Government like this bit really (but not publicly) as it gives them a further oppourtunity to tax the public more,

I THINK NOT!
