1) Evaluation Updates

- Public consultation finalised
 - Erasmus finished in December 2023
 - European Solidarity Corps early February
- 2nd interim report received
- Next milestone: national evaluation reports (deadline 31.05.2024)
 - Draft report submissions would be welcomed





2) Grant Agreements

- Current models are too complicated and too long
 - Lead to contrary effects as beneficiary tend not to read them
 - However, articles and provisions are protecting beneficiaries and NAs
- Request for a simpler model especially for low value contracts below 60.000 EUR
- NA will support COM with examples on simple grants for internal COM discussions with competent BUDG and Legal Service for changes in the future financial regulation





3) Partner countries

- 25 % rule of limiting partner country participation
 - Over entire programming period
 - Overconsumption by some countries levelled out by a lower consumption of those countries having hardly any partner countries in their projects
- Report in the dashboard to be implemented for better monitoring and oversight
- Need to ensure that these fundings are presented as internal policy involving external partners in view of existing Third Country Instruments by DG NEAR and INTPA





4) Capping of applicants and/or partners

- Important changes in 2024 call to respond to the constant wish to improve the functioning of the programme in view to
 - encourage newcomers, as an inclusive programme
 - encourage to submit more thoughtful, well-prepared and qualitative proposals with a solid cooperation
 - o solid supervision and control strategy on Commission and NA level
- Introducing a maximum number of applications individual organisations may be involved as coordinator and/or partner per round
 - O Due to the attempt by some organisations to disproportionately apply (up to 650 applications per round)
- First round shows that there is increased interest for accreditation and the new actions "youth participation" and "DiscoverEU inclusion"

6) How to prepare for the next generation?

- No revolution but evolution
- EU Youth Strategy and Youth Goals further taken into consideration when providing grants
- Megatrends confirmed
 - Commitment to EU values (providing the youth with tools to spread the values)
 - Resilience and ability of young people to participate in a more fragile world
 - Well-being (not only mental) but also societal
 - Programme open to all organisations and focus on impact
- More money for youth is more money for integration
- Higher number of small projects over smaller number of big projects (with simplified grants)
- · Recommendation to lower the age limit in the Corps, especially for Solidarity Projects






Erasmus+ youth in 2022*

Nearly **26 000** projects have been contracted, supporting more than **73 000** organisations from Member States and third countries associated to the programme as applicant or partner¹⁶.

More than **1.2 million** learners and staff carried out a mobility activity in 2022 (individual and group mobility).

Around 134 000 participants with fewer opportunities were supported by the programme (**13.3%** of total participants).

By the end of year 2022, and **since 1987**, over **13.7 million** people had benefited from the programme actions supporting learning mobility.
